A Letter from the Pastor

Dear All,

In your most recent mission study, Carson Mouser wrote about how the Webster church is "committed to each other." I contemplated what it means to be "committed to each other."

I Corinthians 13:4-7 reinforces that love is patient; love is kind. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Paul wrote the letter to the Corinthian church back in the first century CE. Why would the Apostle Paul write to a church reminding them of the virtues of love? Doesn't that seem a little strange? Apparently, there were those in the church who were envious, boastful, irritable, and demanding. This was tearing the church apart.

Proverbs 3:3 says, "Do not let loyalty and faithfulness forsake you." In many ways, it reinforces what the Apostle Paul affirmed to the Corinthian church about love. In the Hebrew language, each word has many subtle meanings. The Hebrew word translated loyalty is the word *chesed*. We have no exact equivalent for it in English. It is often translated as "steadfast love," "loving-kindness," and yes, "loyalty." But it encompasses so much more; it also includes mercy, forgiveness, and compassion. It is a word for love that goes above and beyond the call of duty. The root of the Hebrew word for faithfulness - *aman* - means support, be firm, endure. Proverbs 3:3 reminds us that we need to be willing to love above and beyond the call of duty; it also suggests that we need to be willing to support each other, be firm in our commitment to each other, and to have endurance - to withstand hardship and adversity.

Churches are made up of relationships - the most obvious being between the individual and God, but there is a web of inter-relationships within a church congregation. Learning to get along with other people requires an intentional effort on our part. Relationships go two ways - when something goes wrong in a relationship, it is not all one person's fault. It is important to own what is our part in the relationship. Each of us makes mistakes. Communication breaks down for a time. There are times when one or the other of us will either intentionally or unintentionally hurt another. Love requires forgiveness. Forgiveness requires the courage to make an intentional decision to try to understand. It also means that we are ready to say, "I'm sorry" or to offer our forgiveness to each other. Love also requires us to accept both the good and the bad traits in another - to love people where they are. There are going to be things that sometimes rub us wrong about each other. This is why communication is so important. Communication can leave us vulnerable to each other - but this is part of building a trust relationship and relying on each other to try to seek understanding.

Carson wrote the mission study in May of 2022 - but it is as apropos today as it was three years ago. Carson's fuller sentence reads:

"Each change and transition in the life of the church produced an adaptation... however, adapting... did not mean giving up their trust in God or commitment to each other nor their meaningful practices of faith... it meant reclaiming them and expanding ministries both within the congregation and ministries outward to the local community and global community." (Mouser,18)

Presbyterian Church Webster is continuing to undergo "changes and transitions." These "changes and transitions" are part of a growth process and should be embraced. It doesn't mean that change or transition is easy. It requires reflection - making us consider what is important and what isn't so important. It helps us to "re-frame" ourselves. It also requires us to consider the "why" behind our actions, traditions, and/or ministries and mission partners, and to consider from God's perspective how we might better "reflect Jesus" in this time and place. None of this is easy. There will be "growing pains." But, if Carson's words are true, then you will remain "committed each other" to throughout this process. Let's "stretch" together.

MUSIC MEMORIES

One of our church's most enduring assets has been a strong music program. It has been a real drawing card to welcome new members into a warm, committed fellowship. They saw we had invested in and maintained a quality pipe organ, essential for worship and memorial services, and a first-choice recital venue for Eastman Music students. They also noted our donated Steinway grand piano. We have been blessed to have three bell choirs, thanks mainly to Jackie Anderson's devotion to so many years of leadership and development. And we're happy to see many youth learning to play and contribute to a rewarding worship experience. An important church outreach, our bells are also enjoyed at Cherry Ridge and other locales and have joint programs with other church bell choirs.

WPC Chancel Choir has been a large part of my WPC experience. Soon after Edie and I joined the old Main Street church in 1964, I was welcomed into the choir and was able to relish this friendly singing experience until the Covid pause in mid-March 2020. I sang with a succession of talented directors from Adele Chappell to Lee Ann Daigle. Our esteemed Bob Frost strictly ruled that if you missed Wednesday practice you couldn't sing on Sunday! We have been fortunate to draw on talented Eastman Music students as choir directors, organists like Kat Jolliff, and piano accompanists.

We remember fine long-term organists Bernice Watson, Sandra Gay, and Pat Korenkiewcz. For many years we enjoyed Jim Hoffman's special gifts as Chapel pianist. Our Music & Worship Committee interviewed candidates and guided hymnal and choir robe selections. The choice of music ranged from praise songs to major presentations such as Messiah with a full orchestra, mainly of WPC members. We were treated to children and youth choirs led by Georgia Hubbard and Dawn Wiley.

Each fall our community looked forward to a rousing Festival of Choirs Service, when WPC joined several other Webster church choirs, and we could chat with their singers over supper. After every June Music Day, choir members and spouses celebrated with a potluck picnic, in recent years generously hosted by Don and Nikki George.

Fulfilling an Urgent Need

The Mission Committee answered an urgent need request from the Open Door Mission in Rochester. On those bitter cold nights that we were having in February, the shelter was having 100-150 people in desperate need of a place to sleep and retreat from the cold. They were not set up for having quite that many people and had an urgent need for twin bed sheet sets and blankets. The Mission Committee purchased 18 fleece blankets and 18 sets of sheets and had them delivered directly to the Open Door Mission.

A Prayer for Lent; THE FAST LIFE

Following our theme of being salt and light to one another (Matthew 5:13-16), here is a true story submitted by one of our congregation:

By the time I was 27 years old, I had been married for 5 years, had three children under 3 years of age, one a newborn, had moved to a new town and new home, and my husband had a new job. One day several years later, a friend came to my door and said, "I feel like I am supposed to give you this; that you are on the 'edge of joy." She handed me a book entitled, "Hungry for God" by Ralph Martin. I was touched by her thoughtfulness, yet surprised by her visit. Troubled by not having looked at the book for several months, and not willing to return it until I had read it, I began to read it one Palm Sunday Eve, my husband asleep in bed beside me. Suddenly, I looked up and said to myself, "I am just going to believe all this stuff." I was 33 years old. I had been getting to sleep at night by taking pain medication and alcohol. The stressful circumstances of change when we first moved to our new home, I realized later, had plunged me into depression. I think I was really on the "edge of despair," not on the "edge of joy," as my friend had thought. My life changed. I never needed to use help in getting to sleep again. I spoke of my newfound faith through tears of joy in those early days. I joined a bible study at my church. I delighted in my husband and children. I believe that my friend was a light in my life, inspired by her faith in God to follow that "feeling" deep inside her. I will never forget her gift.
