A Letter from the Pastor

Dear All:

Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream.

Jeremiah 17:7-8

One of the things I have been doing since arriving is to read your *Narrative Transition Mission Study*. In this study, Carson Mouser writes that WPC's history is an interplay of change and transition - often mirroring the change and transitions of the Webster community and the larger world. He says:

"However, adapting to the unfamiliar environment **did not mean giving up their trust in God or commitment to each other nor their meaningful practices of faith.** It meant reclaiming them and expanding ministries both within the congregation and ministries outward to the local community and global community."

Notice the three parts: **Trust in God; Commitment to each other; Meaningful practices of faith**. Carson then goes on to use the words resilience, tenacity, and commitment. Why did these words stick out to me... because you couldn't have this type of resilience, tenacity, and commitment if you weren't "rooted." Webster Presbyterian Church is "rooted" in Christ. You have put your "trust in God." Your faith in God gives you your resilience. Your commitment to be a follower of Jesus Christ "roots" or grounds you. And you show resiliency in your continued living and sharing the love of God which is affirmed by your "welcoming all" statement.

Pictures tell stories like the banner called the "Tree of Life." Ruth Arthur, Meg Marsh, Nancy Carr, Mary Ellen Pacocha, Karen Noske, Jean Maier, Stephanie Lux, and Lindsey Hall all worked on the "tree." They started in Genesis in the Garden - God's creation and with God's created order. In other words, God is King. They included a serpent. The serpent reminds us of our ability to make choices - in this case, one path that chooses not to follow God's instruction but rather, to create one's own path separate from God. I find it interesting that the serpent is on the edge of the hanging branch as if falling off. The Burning Bush is a reference to Moses. I am reminded of Moses' last speech to the Israelites before they passed over into the Promised Land... which included him stressing to the Israelites that they must believe and be willing to walk in God's way which includes God's statutes and God's commandments. The Crown of Thorns reminds us of Jesus' death, and the butterflies - a sign of the Resurrection. This represents the heart of your faith. You'll also find the Vine and the Branches and the Fruits of the Spirit. These speak to your connection to God through Jesus and of the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit in the church's life.

In my study Bible, it says that the words "tree planted by water" is imagery used by Jeremiah suggesting the "tree of life" which can be associated with "wisdom." It goes on to say that for the sages who wrote wisdom literature, wisdom is the ability to perceive the order of God in creation, the intelligence to act in accordance with God's order, and moral behavior that leads to well-being.' Thus, the "Tree of Life" Banner is "wisdom literature." It perceives the order of God in creation; it encourages us to act in accordance with God's order-unlike the serpent who is ready to drop out of the picture—and it stresses moral behavior-by being connected to Christ and by growing our faith and in so doing "acting" out the Fruits of the Spirit- love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. This is WPC and I am proud to be asked to walk alongside you during this time-yet another change and transition in our church community. Thank you for the opportunity.

Trustees' Corner

The Trustees ask that everyone use extra care when walking in the parking lot and on the sidewalks. With the heavy snow and the rock salt shortage, conditions can deteriorate quickly. We may experience more icy conditions than we have seen in the past. Our snowplow contractor, as well as most others in the county, has been forced to limit salting in order to maintain an adequate supply for the rest of the season. We ask that you take the following measures until this cold and snow subsides:

- Slow down drive slow, walk slow; baby steps work well.
- Wear appropriate footwear low heels, good tread, good traction.
- Pay attention to conditions around you; slippery spots form quickly in the frigid temperatures.
- When in doubt, walk like a penguin.

We have been busy fixing areas around the church small repairs here and there to keep the building going. We have made some minor plumbing and

lighting repairs. We continually survey the building for issues and make repairs as needed. We have identified some small roof repairs that need to be completed near the Chapel. Fortunately, these repairs can wait for warmer weather.

Keep an eye out for our spring workday in early May. If you see something that looks like a good project for us to tackle, please see one of the Trustees.

Lastly, we want to remind everyone to use lids on your beverage cups & mugs when entering the Sanctuary to prevent spills. While spills happen, we would like to minimize them to preserve the carpet and keep the Sanctuary a welcoming place for the congregation.

Reflecting on **200** Years

Sharing Memories

I became part of Webster Presbyterian Church in 1959 when I was baptized at the Main Street church by Rev. Roger Smith and my grandfather, Rev. Tom Jones. My father was the church school superintendent for many years, so you can imagine the many hours we spent there. I guess I am following in his footsteps. I thought it was cool that my parents had a key to the church and I loved hanging out in my dad's office. One of the original tables used in one of the Sunday School classrooms is still being used in our church nursery today.

The social hall and kitchen were in the basement of the church where all of the family pot-luck suppers were held. Those were always a highlight and just about everyone from the congregation attended. Fellowship activities were an important part of our church.

I sang in the children's choir. We wore white paper collars with red bows when we sang in worship. We had to be VERY careful to not rip them while waiting to sing. When we sang, we stood in the choir loft which made us feel very important.

There was a staircase leading up to the old bell tower. It had been destroyed in a fire many years before. No one was allowed to go up those stairs, but with my dad busy in his Sunday School office and my mom probably busy running at least one committee meeting, my sister and I decided to investigate. I remember being very disappointed that there was nothing at the top but a locked door. We made it to the top and back without being seen and considered the adventure disappointing, but still a success because we didn't get caught.

Above all else, what I remember most growing up at WPC was the feeling of having a church family and the friendships we made over the years, friendships I still have today because of my times in youth group, work camps, church picnics, and fellowship activities. 200 years later we are still a church family. Time doesn't change everything.

Spiritual Nurture

Dear Friends in Christ, the following was shared with SNC by one of our own and we are sharing it with you:

Hopi Indian leader, White Eagle, commented on the situation we are in:

"This moment that mankind is experiencing now can be seen as either a door or a hole. The decision to fall into the hole or go through the door is yours. If you absorb information 24 hours a day, with negative energy, constantly nervous, and pessimistic, you will fall into this hole. But if you take the opportunity to look at yourself, use the time to rethink life and death, to care for yourself and others, you are walking through the portal. Keep your home, keep your body safe. Connect with your spiritual home. When you take care of yourself, you take care of everyone else. Don't underestimate the spiritual dimension of this crisis. Take the perspective of an eagle that sees everything from above with a broader perspective. There is a social issue in this crisis but also a spiritual issue. They both go hand in hand. Without the social dimension, we fall into bigotry. Without the spiritual dimension, we perish in pessimism and meaninglessness. Are you ready to pass this crisis? Pack your toolbox and use all the tools at your disposal. Learn the resistance from the example of the Indian and African people: We are and still are being threatened by extinction. But we never stopped singing, dancing, building bonfires, and having joy. Don't feel guilty for feeling happy in these difficult times. It doesn't help at all to be sad or angry. Resistance is resistance through joy! You have every right to be strong and positive. And there's no other way to do this than by adopting a beautiful, cheerful, and empathetic attitude. This has nothing to do with alienation (ignorance of the world) - it's a resistance strategy. When we enter the door, we are given a new worldview because we have faced our fears and overcome adversity. That's all you can do now:

- Seek solace in the storm
- Keep calm, pray daily
- Make it a habit to meet the Holy everywhere, every day.
- Show resistance through art, joy, trust, and love."

In this spirit, we invite you to share your stories of salt and light, following the theme we proposed in February (Matthew 5:13-16). Tell about a time when "... a different way of seeing the world leads to a different way of being in the world" (Brian McLaren). Perhaps you were changed through a simple comment that someone made to you, or you experienced something that touched you deeply.
